Lecture 1: An Introduction to the Philosophy of Roger Scruton - Professor Anthony O'Hear

Professor Anthony O'Hear OBE is a writer and philosopher who was awarded Order of the British Empire for his services to education. O'Hear has worked tirelessly and courageously to spread philosophy and knowledge within British universities and alongside Roger Scruton in Central Europe. He was Professor of Philosophy at the University of Bradford and subsequently at the University of Buckingham. He served as Director of the Royal Institute of Philosophy and editor of the journal *Philosophy*. He worked as a special advisor on education to the Conservative government and along with the director of Ofsted, Chris Woodhead, campaigned for higher standards of education in schools. He has worked as an opinion piece writer for many national newspapers. His books are as follows: *Karl Popper* (1980), *What Philosophy Is* (1985), *The Element of Fire* (1989), *An Introduction to the Philosophy of Science* (1990), Beyond Evolution (1997), After Progress (1999), Introducing Christianity (2000), Philosophy in the New Century (2001), Plato's Children (2006), The Great Books: From The Iliad and The Odyssey to Goethe's Faust: A journey through 2,500 years of the West's classic literature (2007), Transcendence, Creation and Incarnation: From Philosophy to Religion (Transcending Boundaries in Philosophy and Theology) (2020).

Jonathan Westphal has spent his working life as an academic philosopher. He has degrees from Harvard College, Sussex University, and a PhD from the University of London. Jonathan has taught at the University of London, the University of Hawaii, Harvard University, Hampshire College and Amherst College. He has been an Alexander von Humboldt Fellow at the University of Munich, and he is a Fellow of Berkeley College, Yale University. He is a Permanent Member of the Senior Common Room at University College, Oxford. His interests in the past have been in metaphysics, the theory of knowledge, and the philosophy of mind, but recently they have turned to ethics, aesthetics and political philosophy.

Andrea Frost is an award-winning writer and author who received her MA Philosophy by Research ('The Philosophy of Wine') with distinction under the supervision of Professor Roger Scruton in 2019. Andrea has 25 years of professional wine experience, and with postgraduate qualifications in philosophy, literary non-fiction and business and marketing. Andrea has received commendations and scholarships for her postgraduate studies at the University of Buckingham, the Yale Writers' Workshop and the Melbourne Business School.



Imogen Sinclair is Director for the New Social Covenant Unit. Imogen has several years' experience working in Parliament and is the author of 'Community Capital' (2019) for the Centre for Social Justice. She holds a Masters with distinction in Philosophy and is a visiting fellow at St Mary's University Institute of Theology and Liberal Arts.

Dr Mikolaj Slawkowski-Rode is Assistant Professor in the Department for Philosophy of Culture at the Faculty of Philosophy, University of Warsaw as well as Research Fellow, and tutor in Philosophy at Blackfriars Hall, University of Oxford. He is also Research Associate of the Ian Ramsey Centre for Science and Religion at the University of Oxford, where he is a member of a team working on a John Templeton Foundation Grant "New Horizons for Science and Religion in Central and Eastern Europe". Dr Slawkowski-Rode's PhD thesis was written under the joint supervision of Sir Roger Scruton in Oxford, and Prof. Zofia Rosinska in Warsaw, and was nominated for the Ministerial Prize for the best research undertaken nationwide in 2016 in Poland. His interests include philosophy of culture, phenomenology, joint attention, and philosophy of mind. Mikolaj Slawkowski-Rode is also a founding member of the Humane Philosophy Society and organizer of the Humane Philosophy Project.

Malcolm Archer - Concert Pianist

Malcolm Archer has been an organist and director of music at three English cathedrals: Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's. He is also a conductor, composer, organist, pianist, and harpsichordist who has given solo concerts across the world, including tours in the U.S., Canada, New Zealand, and Europe. He has recorded with labels including Warner Classics, Hyperion, Lammas, and Convivium. He studied at the Royal College of Music and was an Organ Scholar at Jesus College Cambridge.

Alexander Simpson - Countertenor

Alexander Simpson is a versatile countertenor whose recent operatic roles include Nireno in Giulio Cesare, Cowslip in Fairy Queen, Athamas in Semele, Arsace in Partenope, Arcane in Teseo, and Refugee in Flight. He frequently collaborates with ArtHouse Jersey, Venice Music Project, and the Phoenix Ensemble in Israel. He holds degrees in music from St. John's College, Cambridge and the Royal Academy Opera.

Professor Nick Zangwill is a British philosopher and honorary research professor at University College London and Lincoln University. He is known for his expertise on moral philosophy, and aesthetics. He has also written on metaphysics, theory of knowledge, the philosophy of mind, and logic.

David Goodhart is the founder and former editor of *Prospect* magazine, which he set up in 1995. David has grown *Prospect* into Britain's leading current affairs monthly and he remains the magazine's editor-at-large. David is a prominent figure in public debate in the UK. He is a well-known broadcaster, author, commentator, and journalist who regularly contributes to the *Guardian*, the *Independent*, the *Times*, and the *Financial Times*. David is author of *The British Dream*, about postwar multiculturalism, national identity and immigration. It was short-listed for the Orwell Book Prize in 2014. He is also the author of (a *Sunday Times* bestseller) *The Road to Somewhere: The New Tribes Shaping British Politics*, where David identifies the value divisions in British society that help to explain the Brexit vote and the rise of populism. His most recent book is *Head*, *Hand*, *Heart – The Struggle for Dignity in the 21st Century*.

Louise Perry is a freelance writer and campaigner against sexual violence. Her debut book, *The Case Against the Sexual Revolution:* A *New Guide to Sex in the 21st Century*, argues that the amoral libertinism and callous disenchantment of liberal feminism and our contemporary hypersexualised culture represent more loss than gain, and that it is high-status men that have benefited from the sexual revolution rather than women.

James Gray was first elected as MP for North Wiltshire in May 1997. He was educated at Hillhead Primary School and Glasgow High School and later read History at Glasgow University and Christ Church, Oxford. More recently he was a visiting Parliamentary Fellow of St Antony's College, Oxford and is a graduate of the Royal College of Defence Studies. He has been a kind friend and representative MP to the Scruton family playing a leading role in ensuring the Conservative government apologized and reinstated to Roger Scruton over the Building Beautiful Commission.

Dr Ralph Weir is a Lecturer in Philosophy at the University of Lincoln and a member of the Faculty of Theology and Religion at the University of Oxford. He has a PhD in philosophy from the University of Cambridge and a B. Phil in Philosophy and M.St. in ancient philosophy from the University of Oxford where Roger Scruton was his college Tutor and one of his academic supervisors. He taught alongside Roger on the University of Buckingham's M.A. in philosophy for several years. His recent publications include 'Does Idealism Solve the Problem of Consciousness?' in the Routledge Handbook of Idealism and Immaterialism (2021), 'Can a Post-Galilean Science of Consciousness Avoid Substance Dualism?' in the Journal of Consciousness Studies 28 (2021), and (co-edited with Benedikt Paul Göcke) From Existentialism to Metaphysics: The Philosophy of Stephen Priest (Peter Lang, 2021).
